

Dr. Aya Suzuki

Aya Suzuki is a development economist and a professor at the Department of International Studies, Graduate School of Frontier Sciences, the University of Tokyo. Her primal research interests are on poverty reduction and the role that high-value agriculture can play to achieve that goal. She has studied the linkages of smallholder farmers in Africa and Asia with the global food systems based on field surveys and randomized controlled trials. In particular, she has worked on understanding the differences of prevailed production organizations, adoption of good practices, information dissemination among peers, effects of physical spillovers across farms, and impacts of industrial jobs for unskilled workers. Another area of her research is on the role of managerial capitals in industrial development in Asian countries, and she led research projects in collaborations with the World Bank and the JICA Research Institute. Her works have been published in journals including *World Development*, *American Journal of Agricultural Economics*, *Agricultural Economics*, and *Journal of Development Effectiveness*. She is a founding board member of the Japanese Association for Development Economics and an editorial board member of the *Asian Development Review*. She obtained her Ph.D. from the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics, the University of California, Davis and worked at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies prior to the current affiliation. She served as a visiting scholar at the JICA Research Institute as well as the University of Waikato, New Zealand and also serves as an Assistant to the President of the University of Tokyo.
